PART-TIME EVENING OPTION COMPLETED IN TWO YEARS

Two courses per quarter, six courses each academic year (September - June)

The Master of Advanced Studies in International Affairs (MAS-IA) career track in Security of the Asia-Pacific (SAPAC) benefits professionals seeking career advancement in various security-related vocations.

It is characterized by a curriculum focused on current debates about the security of states, the causes and contexts of conflict, environments and conditions that foster cooperation and the factors that generate both instability and peace.

Domestic and international professionals from the military, government agencies, defense industry and the nonprofit sector advance their careers and organizations with this degree.

The MAS-IA is among the elite approved civilian degrees in the nation for the Navy's Politico-Military curriculum or 2300 subspecialty requirement (National Security/International Relations and Diplomacy) and Foreign Area Officers specializing in China, Northeast Asia, Southeast Asia and Latin America.

PROFESSIONALS IN THE PROGRAM WILL:

- » establish an interdisciplinary foundation in international affairs and security through core, regional and career track courses;
- » tailor an education to meet professional needs through electives;
- » have access to faculty with security expertise in government, military, industry and NGOs;
- » develop analytical tools in a number of fields, including economics, public policy, political science and security; and
- » study key political, economic and security developments in the Pacific region that are likely to affect their professional careers.
